Larry Wilcox is an amateur photographer who has always been an outdoorsman, but most of his time in the woods was in the fall and winter. His wife has been a wildflower enthusiast since her college days and he became interested in wildflowers through her. He started taking pictures of the flowers and was introduced to a whole new area of photography. Larry said, "My wife identifies the plants and I take their photo. I love to travel and really enjoy taking pictures of wildflowers wherever we find them."

His presentation is of a trip that VNPS members took earlier this year to the Southwest corner of our state. The area visited contains many rare and unusual plants growing in diverse habitats, from wet lowlands to high mountain vistas. President's message: Daune said that she would like to see the web site serve as an 'evolving' newsletter with continuous updates as well as bulletin board for the membership. New members' names were announced; guests introduced themselves and were welcomed.

Nicky Staunton's presentation, Digital Journaling - Daily Discoveries or Sharp Eyes on Nature was to a full house. She started with a discussion and explanation of the equipment she uses: the cameras, stabilizers, ring flash, reflectors, polarizer, battery charger and loop, and emphasized the importance of becoming familiar and comfortable with your camera. She referred to the various computer programs which allow the digital nature photographer to "see" what the camera saw and the various places to store digital photos. She describes herself as "an amateur, opportunistic (nature) photographer". When the lights went down and the "photo journal" came up, Nicky gave us a view of the world and her "friends" from her home at Rocks Edge. We saw the grand silhouette of Old Rag Mountain against the sky, the entrance, the dell, the rocks, the critters (mammals, insects, and amphibians, etc.), the life cycle of a butterfly, the plants (trees, flowers, grasses, seeds, fungi etc.) down to the tiniest of things. Nicky showed each of us how to "be aware", to appreciate and enjoy the inter connectedness of all things through digital journaling. "Don't be afraid to try" After a few questions and answers the meeting was adjourned at 9:00.


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Photos from the September 16 Field Trip to R. Garland Dodd Park.



1. At the edge of a forested area in the park Kudzu is taking over. Shown are Kudzu flowers, they are purple and smell like grape drink.

2. Purple False Foxglove (*Agalinis purpurea*) along the boardwalk in the Marsh.

3. Wild rice (*Zizania aquatica*), staminate flowers, along the boardwalk.

4. *Spiranthes cernua* - nodding lady's tresses was not in flower for the field trip, but appeared for a subsequent trip on September 23.
